#### THE PROCLAMATION

Tickhill was proud to come together in a spirit of remembrance and celebration for the 80th anniversary of Victory in Europe Day. The day began at 9:00am with a resounding proclamation by our very own Councillor Baz Cooper, stepping into the historic role of town crier. Our sincere thanks go to the family of the late Ted Corney, former town crier of Doncaster, for the kind loan of his ceremonial regalia — a fitting tribute to local heritage.

## **BEACON LIGHTING**

As evening fell, the sound of church bells rang out across Tickhill at 7:00pm, signalling the start of an evening of reflection and community spirit. A beautiful concert was held in St Mary's Church, featuring performances by the Tickhill Community Choir and a poignant ukulele and pipe tribute.

The celebrations concluded with a moving beacon lighting ceremony at the Buttercross. Harworth Brass played a rousing medley of wartime tunes as the community gathered to sing "I Vow to Thee, My Country", the official VE 80 Day anthem. A reading was delivered by Councillors Johnson and Cooper, followed by the sounding of the Last Post. At 9:30pm, two veterans lit the beacon, representing the light of peace that emerged from the darkness of war followed by the observance of a minutes silence. To close the evening, The National Anthem echoed through the centre of Tickhill as everyone joined together in a moment of national pride.
